## Oklahoma Scenic Rivers Act

The Oklahoma Legislature finds that some of the free-flowing streams and rivers of Oklahoma possess such unique natural scenic beauty, water conservation, fish, wildlife and outdoor recreational values of present and future benefit to the people of the state that it is the policy of the Legislature to **preserve these areas for the benefit of the people of Oklahoma**. For this purpose there are hereby designated certain "scenic river areas" to be preserved as a part of Oklahoma's diminishing resource of free-flowing rivers and streams.



# Oklahoma Scenic Rivers Purpose

Title 300:40-1-1 The purpose... is to establish a system of rules and licensing of commercial float operations and the collection of commercial and private fees to preserve the Scenic Rivers...in their natural state and to preserve the health and safety of the patrons.

# Chapter 40: Rule Changes Effective 2024 Season

# Rule Change: River Levels



#### 300:40-3-3. River Hazards and Closures

(1) Commercial Operations are prohibited when river levels are determined to be at flood stage or the river is still rising and approaching flood stage as determined by the USGS gages. Commercial Operators shall follow the vessel limitations at the heights listed in the following tables.

## Upper River Section at Chewey Gauge:

Raft Floating for Children Age 10 and Under	5 Foot, Six Inches (5'6")
Raft Floating	6 Foot (6')
All Ages	7.5 (71)
No Floating for Children  Age 10 and Under	7 Foot (7')
No Commercial Floating	9 Foot, Six Inches (9'6")
All Ages	

## Lower River Section at Tahlequah Gauge:

Raft Floating for Children Age 10 and Under	6 Foot (6')
Raft Floating All Ages	6 Foot, Six Inches (6'6")
No Floating for Children Age 10 and Under	7 Foot, Six Inches (7'6")
No Commercial Floating All Ages	9 Foot, Six Inches (9'6")

# Rule Change: License Application Requests



- OAC 300:40-1-4(c)(3) ...a Commercial Float Operator may be denied a license or licenses due to environmental and/or safety reasons. In determining whether to issue licenses for the upcoming year, the CEO may consider the following factors:
  - (A) Whether the Operator has engaged in a pattern of willful violation of GRDA rules and regulations;
  - (B) Whether the ecosystem of the river section within which the particular Flotation Device is authorized to float is, or is in danger of being, harmed by the number of Flotation Devices authorized, and it is necessary for the protection of that section of the river to limit the number of licenses;
  - (C) The health and safety of individuals floating on the river is threatened by the number of Flotation Devices currently licensed to float on a particular section of the river; or
  - (D) The Commercial Float Operator has failed to comply with licensing requirements of rule 300:40-1-5 in previous float seasons.

# NSU Defining Carrying Capacity

Carrying capacity can be broadly described as the highest level of public use that a river corridor can support without causing undesirable alterations or significant harm to its various resource values. This study considered four aspects of carrying capacity:



- **Social carrying capacity**: User perceptions of congestion, overcrowding, and related negative social impacts become unacceptable
- Physical/Spatial carrying capacity: Use or activity that a specific physical environment or area can support without exceeding its ecological or spatial limitations
- Ecological carrying capacity: Use that a specific natural area or ecosystem can withstand without experiencing unacceptable changes, disruptions, or damage to its ecological balance and health
- Facility carrying capacity: Use that the various amenities, infrastructure, and facilities within a specific area or zone can accommodate without being overburdened or experiencing negative impacts





# Findings: Review of studies & NSU Surveys (2022-23)





Turbidity: Taken same day ~11am and ~4pm

#### **Water Quality**

- Runoff from livestock and poultry operations within the watershed is the primary source of nutrients and bacteria in the Upper Illinois River
- The primary impacts from recreational use (swimming, wading, floating) are increased turbidity through disturbance of stream sediments and increased bacteria

#### **Erosion**

- Erosion is a natural phenomena associated with flood events in rivers such as the Upper Illinois River. Bank erosion can be partially mitigated by land owners implementing best management practices
- Recreational use increases erosion of fine sediments through disturbance leading to increased turbidity

#### **Ecosystem Health**

- Adequate stream flows are needed to protect fish and other wildlife habitats and maintain water quality. Low flow on the Illinois river are negatively impacting ecosystem health.
- Recreational activities may impact wildlife through disturbance and habitat degradation. The NSU team did
  not find studies or reports suggesting that the impact of recreational use has increased and is contributing to
  new or additional habitat degradation.

#### **NSU Survey of Recreational Users**

 Identified trash as the major concern. Also of concern are inadequate facilities (e.g. parking spaces or restrooms), lack of public access points, increased use of substances and issues related to public safety especially in CFA 2 & 3



# NSU Management Consideration Summary

## **Proposed Management Objectives**

 Maintain water quality, maintain ecological health and diversity, avoid excessive congestion, maintain public safety and maintain adequate facilities.

## Recommended Management Approach

• Management responses vary and include measures such as increasing or improving facilities, reallocating permits to less crowded CFA's, increasing fees, and public education.

## Need for immediate action

 Most proposed management objectives are currently being met. The most urgent need is to improve facilities, especially those relating to trash and littering.



## NSU Management Consideration Detail

### **Social & Physical**

- Educating the public about trash and river pollution, as well as, permissible activities in the river and beach is highly recommended. These activities would include picking up trash, using recycling bins, water pollution, restricted parking and driving on beaches, maintaining social decorum, among others
- No change in the current number of licenses is recommended at this point. However, the agency could consider reallocation of permits from CFA 2 and CFA 3 to CFA 1 to improve social and physical capacities
- It is recommended that the agency coordinate with float operators on restricted launches during peak day hours and holiday weekends to maintain physical, spatial and social capacities
- The agency should consider restricting group sizes while camping (along with current rules) during peak season and holiday weekends to improve social and physical capacities

### **Ecological**

- Collaboration with landowners on protection of lands from erosion and reduction of sediments reaching the river.
   To this end, consider expansion of the Riparian Protection Conservation Easement Program with funding from state agencies
- It is recommended that the agency continue to fund internal ecological studies in the GRDA Scenic Rivers Lab at Northeastern State University



## NSU Management Consideration Detail

## **Facility**

- It is highly recommended that current facilities continue to improve. These include more trash receptacles, bathrooms or porta potties placed strategically on public areas and sandbars along the river, signposts for trash cans, bathrooms and access areas, and reallocation of law enforcement personnel for public safety to CFA 2 and CFA 3 during peak hours in holiday weekends
- The agency should continue coordinating efforts on public safety and facilities with ODOT and law enforcement agencies at the city and county levels
- Increasing the size of parking lots in certain access areas like Peavine Hollow especially during holiday weekends, by reducing the number of camping sites. (If congestion becomes the biggest issue over time, implement timed parking or fee during peak season and holiday weekends)
- Increasing the number of access areas in the northern (Delaware, Adair counties and Arkansas) and southern sections of the river. If possible, provide more camping locations and facilities in such locations

#### **Financial**

- The agency should consider raising day passes from \$1/vessel and the current annual permits from \$10 as issued to private users
- The agency could consider raising the commercial license fee, but after careful consideration on the potential costs to smaller operators



# NSU Economic Analysis of Considerations

- The increase in cost of travel per user has a more significant impact on the individual, but smaller impact upon the frequency of visits, indicating that recreational users are less responsive to marginal price changes
- Increased user fees (permits/day passes) could be used to improve facilities or support other management activities
- Although increase in commercial license fee is desirable, it may hurt smaller operations
- Results support findings from surveys that improvement in facilities can
  - Raise demand for the river for recreational users
  - Balance social capacity with physical and facility carrying capacities
  - Raise willingness to pay by private users



## **GRDA** Constraints

- The majority of Public Access Areas are owned by the Wildlife department with GRDA acting as the custodian. Any improvement or modification to PAAs would need ODWC approval and could require additional funds and personnel.
- GRDA currently invests >\$2.5 million on Scenic Rivers annually.
- Private and commercial use changes require a statutory rule change which is subject to the rulemaking process. The rulemaking timeline lengthy and any change proposed now would not be effective before 2026 float season.



# Capacity Study Next Steps

 Form a representative committee of CFOs, GRDA, ODWC (as necessary) to discuss potential implications of and remedies in response to the capacity study




## 2023 Float Season Statistics





- 1041 calls for GRDA police response were on or near the Illinois River
- Total call breakdown by CFA\*
  - 53 calls (5%) were for Float Area 1
  - 399 calls (38%) were for Float Area 2
  - 516 calls (50%) were for Float Area 3
  - 73 calls (7%) were unspecified areas
- 16 calls (1.5%) were for rescues


## CALLS BY COMMERCIAL FLOAT AREA

# License Application Requests

- OAC 300:40-1-5(d) Any licensing of flotation devices in excess of said 3,900 shall be subject to approval of the GRDA if the applicant reasonably demonstrates there will not be an adverse impact on the waterways within the jurisdiction of the GRDA. Such additional licensing shall be determined on the basis of density of current usage, number of licenses requested, and other considerations necessary for river protection.
- No applicant addressed issuing licenses in excess of 3,900 nor did they attempt to demonstrate "there will not be an adverse impact on the waterways within the jurisdiction of the GRDA".
